In 1921, 275 people declared Jewish religion while 237 declared Jewish nationality. [CAHJP, HM2/9138.6](#)

Lysiec is a village on the right bank of the Bystritsa Solotvinska river (a tributary of the Dniester), at the foot of the Carpathian Mountains, 10 km south-west to Ivano-Frankivs'k and 8 km north-east from Bohorodchany.
