Population Data:

In 1880, there were 1,487 inhabitants, of them 8 Poles and the rest - Ukrainians ([Słownik, vol. 6, p. 93](#)).

According to the statistical data submitted by the local authorities on June 1, 1920, there were 2285 people in Maniawa: 27 (Roman -Catholics), 2229 Russians and 29 Jews. ([CAHJP, Hm2/8888.14](#))

According to [the census of 1921](#) (not including the army register) there were 1896 people in

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Maniawa (921 men, 975 women) : 16 declared Jewish religion while 14 declared Jewish nationality.

Before World War II there were five Jewish families in the village.

Currently, there are 3,400 inhabitants.

Maniava is a village at the foots of Carpathian Mountains (Gorgoni Hills), on Maniavka River (a tributary of the Bystritsa Solotvinska River), 8 km southwest from [Solotvin](#), 23 km from [Bohorodchany](#) and 45 km from [Ivano-Frankivsk](#).
