Bohorodczany (Brotchin) - after WWII

Community: Bohorodchany (Brotchin)

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On March 31, 1944, a Soviet tank squadron attempted to conquer Bohorodchany but was pushed back by the Germans. The town was finally liberated by the Soviets on July 28, 1944 (<u>"Istoriia</u> <u>Bohorodchaniv,"</u> 86).

Only fifty or so Bohorodchany Jews survived the Holocaust in the area. Among the survivors were the <u>Rothenberg</u> and <u>Luster</u> families, <u>Benjamin Reuben</u>, <u>Buzsi Koenigsberg</u>, <u>Naftali Gold</u>, <u>Koppelman</u>, <u>Chaim Bru</u>, <u>David Schmertzler</u>, and others (<u>M. Hasten</u>, <u>Mark My Words</u>, 350-5).

No Jews returned to Bohorodchany after World War II.

In the Soviet years the synagogues were destroyed and the Jewish cemetery almost completely disappeared (<u>Grandeur and Glory</u>, 4).

A monument to the Bohorodczany Jews was erected in the Jewish cemetery in Ivano-Frankivsk by the Hasten and Halpern families in August 2002 (see <u>photographs</u>).
